

# **Consent form: Teaching Practices at UBC 2023**

The UBC Teaching Practices Survey explores faculty teaching practices, attitudes about teaching, and perceptions of the teaching climate at UBC.

Your participation in this year's survey is especially important as teaching at UBC has changed substantively since the last survey in 2018. Your responses will help UBC better understand the potential long-term implications of this change and how best to support teaching in these new circumstances.

### How is the study done?

Your participation in the study will involve responding to a confidential online questionnaire that will take approximately 20-30 minutes to complete. You will be asked a set of questions regarding your teaching practices, attitudes about teaching, and perceptions of the teaching climate at UBC. This study has received no external funding.

#### How will your privacy be maintained?

Your confidentiality and privacy will be respected at all points of the study. Only the Principal Investigator will have access to the raw data and will ensure that any instances of self-disclosure and identifying references are anonymized before the data is shared with the larger research team. No data will be analyzed or reported for any group with less than 5 survey participants. Only aggregate data and anonymized quotes will be shared outside the research team. All data will be encrypted and password protected, and held in a password protected file space accessible only to the research team.

#### Is there any way being in this study could pose a risk for you?

There are no anticipated risks for participants. However, some of the questions you will be asked may seem personal. You may skip any question you do not wish to answer (except the inclusion question) and you can opt out of the survey at any time with no repercussions.

### What are the benefits of participating in this study?

There are no explicit benefits to participants taking part in this study. However, this study will provide you with an opportunity to share your views about teaching at UBC, which will inform decisions around teaching and learning support.

### What happens next?

Once the survey closes and the data has been anonymized, the research team will analyze the results and produce a series of reports using aggregate data and anonymized quotes. An institutional report with aggregate data will be shared with UBC leadership, Faculty-specific reports will be shared with Associate Deans of each Faculty, and shorter reports will be produced for UBC units that contributed questions to the surveys.
